Donald Williamson, Ph.D., will launch the Institute's new speaker series, designed to challenge and enlighten audiences. Workshop I: Demonstration and discussion of the T-Group (Skill/Family) in its first decade (the 1950s) and as it is utilized today in business. (Methodology: Interactive/Dialogical)

The T-Group has been the experiential heart of LIOS education since 1969. The first T (for training) Group was held in 1947. Six years later Bob Crosby experienced his first such group at Boston University where Ken Benne (one of the 3 T-Group “inventors” along with Ron Lippitt and Leland Bradford) taught. Benne was a Philosopher, Lippitt a Social-Psychologist, and Bradford an adult educator. Kurt Lewin was their mentor.

During the 1950s and 60s, while a National Staff in charge of T-Groups for the United Methodist Church, Bob Crosby witnessed all three of these original leaders in action and began a 25 year mentorship under Dr. Lippitt. The early classic T-Group as led by Lippitt and Benne will be demonstrated. In the 21st century the use of the T-Group in business has declined so much that a key international O.D. source has declared its total demise. Not so! LIOS grads are leading the modern equivalent in several industries.

The current T-Group will be demonstrated with emphasis on marketing and adaptations that have now made the skill-group outer circle the most marketable innovation. Thousands (including union members) have experienced this LIOS-influenced T/Skill-family/group led by graduates of LIOS and the LIOS post-graduate Trainer of Trainer Programs. Bob Crosby’s article “Training for Authenticity” will be given to each participant. Chris Crosby who holds degrees in both tracks from LIOS and who has been deeply involved in the use of T-Skill groups in Alcoa during the last eight years, will discuss how to use the skill group as a key to creative change—not merely as a training selected from strategic and systems changes.

Workshop II: Stages of Faith and the role of the T/Skill/Family Group in Faith/Spiritual Development (Methodology: Interactive/Dialogical)

Using Fowler’s stages as a framework, participants will be invited to tell their own story of faith development. Special emphasis will be given to the movement from a child/adolescent stage to the spirituality inherent in later stages

and the role of the T/Skill/Family Group in that development. Bob Crosby’s book, “Get Unstuck from Fundamentalism” will be given to each participant with specific references made to those chapters that particularly stretch one beyond the early stages of faith. For instance, Chapter Two distinguishes between the Ego and one’s essence or soul. The distinction between faith (as a verb), beliefs, religion, and spirituality will be discussed. This session, both experiential and didactic in design, should help one both sharpen the role (influence) of the T/Skill/Family Group in spiritual growth, and enhance one’s own spiritual journey.

CONVERSATIONS OF LOVE AND TRUTH A training video series for professionals who work with families

LIOS faculty members Tim Weber and Cheryl Cebula are collaborating on a video project with LIOS alums, Judith Young, MA (Winter 05) and Robert Shakleford, MA (Winter 06). Judith and Robert, both with extensive film and video experience, proposed the development of a series of training tapes featuring the Intensive Family of Origin Consultation. COACHING FOR NONPROFIT LEADERS

The Executive Service Corps of Washington provides affordable, high impact leadership coaching services for nonprofit Executive Directors, CEOs, board presidents, school leaders, and other managers.

What is Leadership Coaching?

Coaching is a process that can help nonprofit leaders identify their personal and organizational values and to be more successful in achieving goals. By examining styles of learning, decision making, people management, and more, leaders can build on their strengths and abilities.

Through sessions with a coach, individuals identify goals and barriers to success—then strategize actions to achieve their objectives.

Who are the ESC Coaches?

ESC Coaches volunteer their services to ESC. Before being approved as an ESC coach, each person is interviewed by a committee of coaches. Leaders wanting to work with a coach are given two or more ESC coaches to interview and the leader selects the person who they feel is a best match.

What are the Expected Impacts of ESC coaching services?

A recent evaluation by Compasspoint of the impact of coaching on nonprofit leaders found that coaching had an impact in several areas:

- Improved confidence, clarity and ability to guide the organization toward fulfillment of its vision.
- Enhanced relationships with staff, Board and others.
- Improved time management and productivity.
- Increased job satisfaction and optimism about the organization.
- Expanded personal and organizational capacity.

Cost:

Because of the support ESC receives from charitable sources, fees are low and service grants are offered for a portion of the cost of ESC coaching services. Hourly fees are on a sliding scale, based on the budget of the organization.

LIOS second-year students and recent graduates are invited to interview for participation in Coaching for Nonprofit Leaders.

SPIRIT AND PROFESSIONAL INTEGRITY: THE EMBODIMENT OF INTEGRITY IN PERSONAL LIFE AND PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

Donald Williamson, Ph.D. and Timothy Weber, Ph.D. lead this seminar in which they pursue the question: Is it possible to integrate high skill and artistry in professional practice with the language and habits of a heartfelt and intentional spiritual commitment?

Human beings yearn for transcendence and search for the Beloved. Throughout we are haunted by certain questions. Are we alone in the universe? Is there spiritual purpose to life? Towards what are we in motion? What is “the good life?” Simplistic answers insult the intelligence. Dismissing the questions deadens the soul and shortens the conversation. Is there a third alternative? How does all this bear on professional practice?

Consider the 20th century (the bloodiest of them all) culminating with genocides in both Europe and Africa, through the war in Iraq, to the dark impulses in our own individual divided hearts. We are fascinated, appalled and baffled by the unending battle between good and evil.

How we respond to these questions and to the “awe-ful” truth about ourselves will define and organize our approach to professional life. This pilgrimage of spirit is a solitary but not a lonely journey. There is no exclusively right (or left) answer. So the only condition for membership is that you are a seeker willing to speak your truth and hungry both to experience and contribute to an open-minded, caring and passionate professional community.

The Relational Integrity model will be applied in theory and practice throughout the seminar. The goal of the seminar is that each member experience a greater freedom and fluency with the language of spirit in professional practice and a higher attunement to the presence of spirit in work.

SEMINAR FORMAT: This seminar series will meet for 5 hours, one Friday per month for 9 months, with four distinct elements in each meeting.
